From your Parish Council

Many thanks to all the residents who took the time to attend the Annual Parish Meeting in June and for all those who completed the Questionnaire in the June edition of the Parish Chronicle or sent emails to me setting out their views on priority issues for the village. There is still time to send me your responses and views which will be collated and looked at by the Parish Council funding sub-group who will then report back to the Parish Council.

For those who were unable to attend the Annual Parish Meeting a summary of my report is set out below:



Report by Chair to the Annual Parish Meeting

Following Cllr David Carter's decision not to seek reelection at the Parish Council elections last year I agreed to take on the role of Chair of the Parish Council and was encouraged to do so by my fellow Councillors. The Parish Council as elected consisted of six members: Jan Kemp, Duncan Henderson, Susan Rutherford, Maureen Pearman, Philip Fejer and me. During the course of the year we were pleased to be joined by Sally Monkman and the return of David Carter as co-opted members, and we currently have one vacancy. All the Parish Councillors are volunteers and receive no remuneration.

The Council employs a Parish Clerk who is paid a salary. In 2023 our previous Clerk decided to resign, and we were left without a functioning Clerk for several months. We have had significant difficulty in recruiting a new Clerk, in common with many other Parishes in Norfolk. We have been extremely fortunate to have had the support during this period of Gemma Harrison who is the Town Clerk at Holt, and the Parish Clerk at Cley. Gemma was also previously the Clerk at High Kelling.

Most of you will be aware that a Parish Council receives funds each year from the District Council to enable it to carry out its activities. The funds are raised via the Council Tax and is known as the Parish Precept. The precept for 2023-24 was increased substantially for several reasons. It had not been increased for some time and our reserves were very limited, meaning that it was very difficult to fund any improvements to the Village. I am very pleased to say that our finances are now in a far better state and this year we were able to agree that there should be no further increase, so residents are paying the same by way of the precept as the amount they paid last year.

The Parish Council have continued to keep villagers informed via the Parish Chronicle which is now published on ten occasions each year. We are extremely grateful to Cllr Duncan Henderson for editing and producing the Parish Chronicle, to

our advertisers who help to fund the newsletter, and the Trustees of the Village Hall who contribute to production costs each year. We hope residents consider the Chronicle to be useful. We are always open to suggestions as to how communication can be improved.

Some projects which the Parish Council had hoped to progress have been delayed for a variety of reasons. The purchase of a speed camera for the village has been in the pipeline for some time. We were advised in the press in March that funding for High Kelling had been approved but we are still waiting for written confirmation so that we can go ahead with the purchase of the equipment. Following concerns by residents about vehicles driving too close to the pavement on the A148 we agreed with Highways that it would be useful to have a white line painted along the road edge. This was agreed at the end of October, but it took until 10th June for it to be installed. We are currently awaiting new signs close to the crossing to the Church warning of pedestrians. We have been told that signs have been ordered and should be in place soon.

Last year we had significant problems in persuading the County Council to cut the grass at the Pineheath Road junction with the A148, to the point where visibility became a problem. There was only provision for two cuts each year. This year the Parish Council decided that we should employ a gardener to cut this area twice a month and the areas of grass adjacent to the Parish sign and Jubilee bench. We are happy to consider other areas in the Village which may need attention on a less regular basis.

There have been concerns expressed by some residents that the village might not get Full Fibre Broadband. It is very difficult to obtain commitments from the providers but as far as I am aware it will be available in some or possibly all parts of the village from Virgin Media later this year and that Openreach will be connected by late 2025. That would then mean that Full Fibre could be purchased from all the various suppliers.

One of the functions of the Parish Council is to comment on planning applications submitted on sites within the Parish boundaries. We have had very few applications in the last year but we are expecting an application being made in respect of the former Pineheath care home. The provisional plans we have seen show the conversion of the buildings on site to 35 units of accommodation, access being from the existing narrow road onto the A148 with improved visibility splays but no provision for affordable housing. It is difficult to see that this proposed development would get approval given the narrow entrance and the speed and volume of vehicles using the A148. The Parish Council will keep residents informed as to any applications made in relation to this site and will arrange a special meeting if we feel this appropriate.

Finally, I would like to thank my fellow Councillors for their dedication, all the villagers who volunteer in keeping the village free of litter and the grass verges neat and tidy, and the three residents who have agreed to clean the old telephone kiosk where one of the defibrillators is sited. If there are any villagers who are happy to volunteer to help in projects to improve or maintain the village then please get in touch with me or one of the other Councillors.

On concluding the pick we enjoyed bacon rolls and meat-free sausage buns with hot drinks, courtesy of Silvia and Ruth at the Village Hall. Thanks to the Village Hall Trustees for allowing us to use the kitchen and main hall as our base.

The next planned litter-pick will be at the end of what we quaintly refer to as 'the Summer'!

High Kelling Annual Parish Meeting and Public Consultation 2024

The High Kelling Annual Parish Meeting took place on the 18th June 2024, attended by 26 people. The principal business was a Public Consultation led by Cllr Maureen Pearman of Pineheath Road ahead of launching a programme of fundraising and grant applications to support emerging Parish Projects for the benefit of the local community.

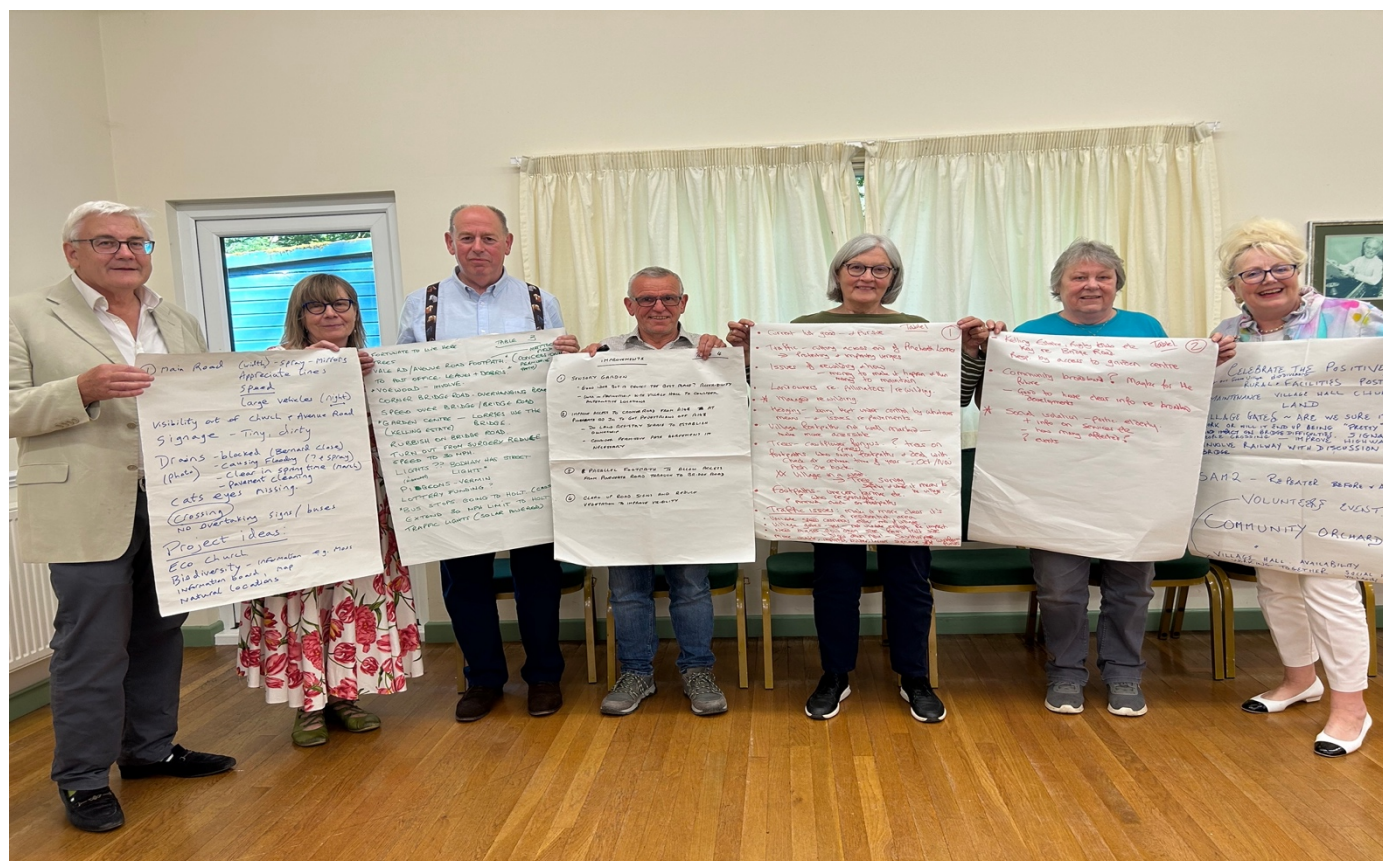


Cllr Pearman explained that the purpose of the Consultation was to discuss funding opportunities and to engage and consult villagers on ideas for projects. This will enable the Parish Council's new Funding sub-Group to achieve a more targeted and effective funding approach, pursuant to its commitment to meet the needs of villagers by pursuing as many funding opportunities as possible and through engagement with a range of stakeholders for the benefit of the village. The members of the sub-Group are Cllrs Maureen Pearman (Chair), Susan Rutherford, Sally Monkman and Philip Fejer.

Residents were divided into five groups to share their thoughts and ideas for improving village life. These were recorded on flip-chart paper and facilitators then summarised each group's main discussion points. Many good ideas were put forward for possible funding. All this information will be collated and reviewed by the Funding Group and residents will be kept informed of progress over the coming months in future issues of the Chronicle.

The Funding sub-Group will next be meeting on the 15th July to analyse the findings from the Parish Meeting, completed questionnaires and emails received. It will be holding a Zoom session with the Senior Grant Officer from GrantScape to discuss the criteria for the next funding round of the Hornsea 3 Community Fund. Residents' ideas and suggestions will be discussed at this meeting and the outcome will be reported back in due course. Cllr Pearman thanked all those attending meeting for the useful feedback.

Residents who have not yet completed the questionnaire that was included in issue 39 of the Chronicle (June 2024) are invited to do so as soon as possible. Alternatively, the relevant pages can be downloaded from the digital versions of that issue published on both the Parish Council and Village Hall websites or a hard copy can be requested from any Parish Councillor (see the Parish Council noticeboards for contact details).

One of the initiatives to emerge from the Public Consultation was that volunteers should be encouraged to undertake tasks around the village to enhance our environment, rather than being dependent on them being done 'as and when' by the local public authorities.



Before ...

Resident Ian Alderson of Pineheath Road, a member of the village Speed Watch Team, lost no time in undertaking a survey of the state of the road signs along the A148 and organising a spruce-up. This took place on the 26th June when six volunteers gave the signs a thorough scrubbing and cut back overhanging vegetation.



The result of their labours was a marked improvement in the visibility of the signs. Whether that results in a noticeable decrease in traffic speed remains to be seen. We're not holding our breath!

After

There are plenty more such tasks that villagers could undertake, including clearing of debris from the pavements, cleaning out the bus shelters and defibrillator kiosk, keeping the footpaths around the village clear of encroaching vegetation and spreading grit on the roads if we ever get proper winter snow again. Not to mention the bi-annual Village Litter-Pick and Path Clearance mornings (see page 5 for Cllr David Carter's report on the most recent one). HRH King Charles III Royal Portrait

Some readers will be aware that, High Kelling Parish Council recently received a portrait of King Charles III which is now displayed in the High Kelling Village Hall. The portrait of Queen Elizabeth II has been moved to the Constance Gray Room.



Village Hall Defibrillator

The defibrillator located outside the Village Hall is approaching the point when it should be replaced. To avoid it failing when needed, we decided to replace it sooner rather than later. We are aware grants for the purchase of defibrillators are available from some organisations, but such grants tend not to be available for replacements. Also, where grants are available for replacements, there are constraints which would rule out or jeopardise the Village Hall being funded. Our view is that we would rather purchase a defibrillator from our own funds than risk not having a working defibrillator on site.

Village Hall Management Committee

Our shortage of committee members (Trustees) continues, so we need more members to run the Village Hall in accordance with our constitution. Currently, we have six trustees. Committee members who do not hold officer positions are also required.

Currently, we have two officer posts to fill: Bookings Secretary and Website Manager. Our planned meetings for this year are 12th July, 13th September and 8th November. Finally, on Sunday, an open-air Service of Thanksgiving was held, accompanied by the Cromer and Sheringham Brass Band and attended by the Lord-Lieutenant of Norfolk, the Lady Dannatt MBE. This was followed by tea and copious quantities of cake while the band played on.

Many people visited the church over the course of the weekend to take in the Flower Festival that ran concurrently, and to enjoy the refreshments.

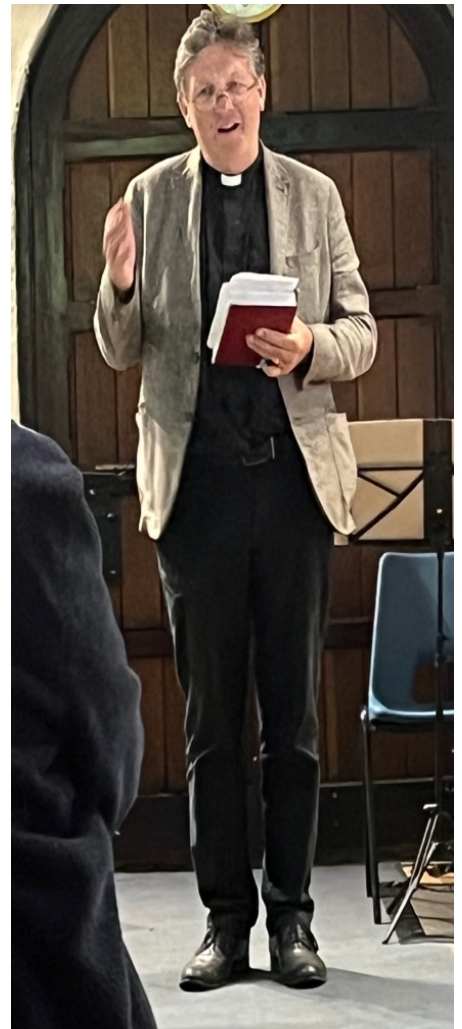

It seems impossible that our youthful Rector has been our pastor, priest, and friend for 25 years. He would be the first to pay tribute to his assistant priests, churchwardens and the host of others who help in so many ways to keep the show on the road. His kindness, empathy, humour, strength of faith, character and leadership, availability, patience and never-failing willingness to offer guidance, encouragement and a cheery greeting are his gift to us, and we thank God for it.

We wish to acknowledge her part in creating the extraordinary warmth, fellowship, comfort and friendship which are the hallmarks of Howard’s ministry.

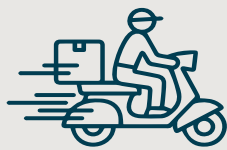
