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Editorial Note

As this issue goes to press we are enjoying our first sunshine after what seems like weeks of very cold, icy weather. Long may it continue! Hopefully everyone managed the cold snap alright but if you or anyone you know is struggling with energy costs, do remember that the Holt and Community District Support Fund (Energy) may be able to help. And if you are in the fortunate position of not needing the energy subsidy the government provided to so many regardless of wealth then please consider donating some or even all of it to the Fund.

In this issue Chair of the Parish Council, Cllr David Carter, highlights the calls on the Council's finances which will require it to raise the precept for the coming financial year. One of those is the monthly cost of producing the Chronicle. We are looking at ways of reducing costs, including perhaps combining the December/January and July/August issues. Financial savings aside, this will have the welcome benefit to our regular contributors of giving them a couple of months off during the year.

Another option would be to publish the Chronicle on-line only via the Parish Council and Village Hall websites but the Council is presently reluctant to take this course. We bear in mind that not every household is connected to the internet and, even among those that are, it requires some effort to seek out an on-line edition as opposed to the convenience of having it drop through the letterbox.

Apart from anything else, distributing the hard copy is a useful way of showcasing High Kelling's active friendly, active and caring community, and our market research indicates that it has increased house prices in the village by 10% during the time we have been publishing it. (Nah, I made the last bit up, but you get my drift.) All the indications are that a hard copy is appreciated, with only one household having requested to opt out and then only because the property in question is largely unoccupied. But do let the Parish Council know your views, favourable or otherwise, by sending me an email (highkellingchronicle@gmail.com) or writing to the Parish Clerk.

Finally, do please read Cllr Peter Rutherford's article about the Parish Council's thinking on possible 'section 106' benefits in the event of future development affecting the village, and his invitation to villagers to make further suggestions. But be careful what you wish for; a by-pass would be lovely, but it's likely only to come with a massive housing scheme attached!

From your Parish Council

At its January meeting your Parish Council set about determining the budget for the financial year 1st April 2023 - 31st March 2024. The sum is then included, as a precept, in the Council Tax bill issued by North Norfolk District Council. The Parish Council carefully analysed its spending plans, being very aware of the financial pressures on households whilst at the same time continuing to maintain standards. A potential



major expense is the sum of £2,000 which it may be required to contribute towards the arrangements for the May elections, even if there are no elections as such for places on the Parish Council. There is only a requirement to hold a Parish Council election should more villagers put themselves forward than the nine places on the Council.

The production of the monthly High Kelling Parish Chronicle is another major expense. The Parish Council felt this was part of its commitment to villagers to engage and keep them informed of matters of importance. The Village Hall Management Committee provides a significant contribution, as does advertising revenue, both much appreciated. The Parish Council will be working hard to attract more of the latter, subject to maintaining the correct balance between articles and advertising.

Finally, the Parish Council also necessarily has to provide for the costs of the Parish Clerk and those for training new Councillors.

All the above costs, with others, require the Parish Council to raise the precept, which for the coming financial year will equate to just over £38 for a Band D Property.

Standing as a Parish Councillor

It is very likely that several of the current nine Parish Councillors will be standing down at election time and replacements will need to come from new nominees or cooptions. Should you feel able, please consider getting nominated for a place on the Parish Council. The Parish Clerk can explain the role and talk you through the nomination process. It's important that the work of the Parish Council to maintain and improve the village continues, as does its role in working with the District and County Council. As mentioned above full training will be available.

Continuing support for the Treehouse Community Fridge.

The weekly box of donations of food, household goods and toiletries continue to be delivered and are very gratefully received. Donations can be left at the Village Hall and the General Store and Post Office.

Developers' contributions to support services and infrastructure.

As noted elsewhere in this issue, the Parish Council has been looking at possible improvements in the village that could be funded by developers should any of the larger sites be the subject of planning applications. This could involve a legally binding agreement to address highways and footpaths issues or other benefits for the village.

If you have any other ideas, please do let Cllr Peter Rutherford or the Parish Clerk know.

Commissioning the defibrillator in the old phone kiosk at outside the village store.

This item was funded by the then High Kelling Society, the District Council and your Parish Council. Regrettably there has been a delay in it being registered with the relevant NHS services. Please be assured that this is being pursued.

News from Your Village Hall

Firstly, some good news for all readers - after a huge demand from villagers, I've not put in any of my jokes this time.

TIGH MELLING VILLAGE HALL

Well, the weather has certainly been wintry even if we've not had any snow. The testing conditions put a strain on the hall's heating system, possibly compounded by some well-meant but unwelcome meddling by persons unknown with the boiler controls! Anyway, we have carried out the necessary repairs and the systems are now functioning properly again. We still have another month or two of winter ahead of us but, looking on the bright side, snowdrops are now appearing and, whilst I write this, the sun is visible.

<u>Maintenance – Issue of the month</u>

A somewhat unpleasant smell has developed in the kitchen area. Fearing it might be a gas leak we had the whole system checked, but no gas was detected by the very sensitive equipment used by the engineer plus the system passed the 10-minute pressure test with absolutely no leakage. So the good news is that the smell isn't likely to cause an explosion! The bad news is that we've not yet categorically identified the cause – we know it's not emanating from the kitchen itself but appears to be coming from the flat roof void above, indicating that we may have some wildlife in that space though no-one has reported hearing the patter of little feet or other noises. Now that we're clear of frosts, we'll inspect the roof and soffits to see if there are any signs of animal ingress.

Dear Friends,

Beginning with the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on the 22nd February, the season of Lent is one of the great seasons in the Church's calendar. It is seen as a means of preparation for our celebration of our Lord's death and resurrection. In the first three centuries of the Church's history the period of preparation lasted only three days prior to Easter. But as new converts were admitted into the Church through the sacrament of baptism on Easter day their period of preparation was extended to forty days, the number of days Jesus spent in the wilderness. In time it was not only those preparing for baptism at Easter who were encouraged to keep Lent but all devout Christians as a means of preparation for Holy Week and Easter. The season continues to be characterised by prayer, fasting and alms-giving and the faithful are encouraged to put aside more time for prayer, to make personal sacrifices by giving something up and to be generous in giving.

While the observance of Lent is not what it used to be, it remains a season of opportunity for spiritual renewal and growth and not just for weight loss! So as well as giving up on chocolate, alcohol or desserts, I hope people will be encouraged to consider their spiritual lives and their relationship with a loving, forgiving God who's saving love is revealed through the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross and so deepen the faith we already have.

Join us as we strive to keep a holy Lent.

Potential Development Benefits – Have Your Say!

Cllr Peter Rutherford writes about the initiative being taken by High Kelling Parish Council regarding potential spin-offs in the event of development in or around the village.

Section 106 of The Town & Country Planning Act 1990 allows a local planning authority to enter into a legally binding agreement with a landowner as part of the granting of planning permission.

These agreements are a way of delivering or addressing matters that are necessary to make a development acceptable in planning terms. They can be used to support the provision of services and infrastructure such as highways, recreational facilities, education, health and affordable housing.

Planning obligations must be directly relevant to the proposed development and are used for three purposes:

- Prescribing the nature of development (for example, requiring a given portion of housing to be affordable);
- Compensating for loss or damage created by a development (for example, loss of open space);
- Mitigating a development's impact (for example, increased public transport provision).

Negotiations over the levels of planning obligations must take into account market conditions and development viability.

Before a section 106 Agreement can be made it must satisfy three tests, namely that it is:

- Necessary to make the development acceptable in planning terms;
- Directly related to the development; and
- Fairly and reasonably related in scale and kind to the development.

High Kelling Parish Council needs to be prepared to put forward proposals for consideration in the event of a significant development proposal being made affecting the village, for which it will usually have only a limited time to make representations. Parish Councillors have listed the following possible outcomes that might be relevant if the scale of a proposed development suggests that a section 106 Agreement might be appropriate:

- Additional traffic calming measures could be introduced on the A148, such as increasing the number of 30mph roundels on the road surface;
- Funding of permanent speed cameras through the village;
- Improvements to the footpaths and/or cycleways within the vicinity of any development;
- Improving access to bus stops in the village;
- Provision of street lighting at any new or improved junction with the A148;
- Provision of a pedestrian crossing within the village;
- Improvements to current facilities within the village, such as the Village Hall.

However, if anyone in the village wishes to make suggestions for improvements that might be included in any future section 106 Agreement and which satisfy the criteria outlined above then please let me know by email at peter@rutherford.world.

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
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
